LARC AWARDS

The award season is upon us. Let's take a look at the background and rules of each of the awards offered annually by the Lincoln Amateur Radio Club.

ROBERT FRICKE HOMEBREW AWARD

Funded by a generous contribution to the Lincoln Amateur Radio Club, this annual award will include a certificate and \$100 cash. At the November meeting, a panel of judges will evaluate entries, and apply a consistent scoring system. The awards committee will announce the winner at the club's annual holiday party.

Bob Fricke, WØPOL, was a consummate builder, producing finished products that could have been mistaken for commercially manufactured equipment. After he died in 2004, many of his kits were sold at auction. Bob's wife, Martha, established the award in 2005.

For each entry, each judge will score the entry and then turn in the signed sheets to the awards committee. Only current members of the Lincoln Amateur Radio Club will be eligible for the award. The judging criteria is as follows. Bring your homemade item to the November meeting for judging.

Each judge will award up to 10 points for each of the following criteria:

- Overall appearance (to a layman)
- Circuit appearance (soldering, etc.)
- ◆ Overall design/layout
- Custom design (five automatic points if the circuit was developed by the entrant)
- Operation
- Achievement of objective (Does it do what was intended?)

JERRY COX AWARD

In the early 1950s, Jerry Cox, WØMAO, was without a doubt the most active Ham in the Lincoln area. Though disabled and in a wheelchair, he was on the air constantly, monitoring several frequencies and providing assistance where needed. Jerry became a silent key about 1960, and his mother thought it seemed fitting to recognize Amateur Radio operators who carried on his dedicated interest in ham radio. At that time the Jerry Cox Award came into being, sponsored by the Lincoln MARS Club [used at NEMA EOC].

The award was to be presented annually to the Ham whose interests closely followed the interests of Jerry — excellent operating techniques, active in public service, and an interest in experimenting and exploring things of a technical nature. In addition, the Ham should be friendly to all and eager to help new Hams. It is not designed to be a popularity contest. Nominees are to be made by fellow Hams and the recipient selected from those nominated.

All nominations are to be in writing and submitted to the selection committee no later than November 15. The recipient has his or her name and call affixed to the award plaque, recognizing excellence in the Amateur Radio community.

ED WOERNER MENTORING AWARD

This award is presented to an individual who has acted as a mentor (or "Elmer") and helped other Ham operators to advance in the hobby. By definition, a mentor is a wise and trusted counselor or teacher. Ham operators have a tradition of helping one another, and the Ed Woerner Award is given to one whose assistance has gone above and beyond what would have been expected. Nominations for this award are sought from Amateur Radio operators in the area; club membership is not necessary.

JERRY KOHN PUBLIC SERVICE AWARD

Jerry Kohn, WDØEGK, died of a stroke on November 2, 2008. Dr. Kohn was a family dentist to some club members, but to many more of us he was the spark plug for numerous public service events. He was one of a handful of Hams who had worked with the Cornhusker State Games every year since its inception in 1984.

There was seldom a public service event that Jerry missed. His volunteer hours total was either at the top or near the top of the list year after year. Jerry served on the LARC Board a total of 14 years, beginning in 1980. The Jerry Kohn Award was created in 2008 to recognize outstanding public service by a club member based on statistics showing total participation and factors such as total hours or bike miles.

STEVE MAY AWARD

Steve May, WAØASM, loved a challenge and always worked to fix his own radios as well as those of others. He was a man who never needed recognition but was always there to help. This award recognizes a club member who sees a need and steps forward to take it on without expecting recognition, and always with a smile. The current Board will select the recipient and present it at the club holiday party.

ACHIEVING A "CLEAN SWEEP" IS THE BRASS RING OF ARRL NOVEMBER SWEEPSTAKES



The <u>ARRL November Sweepstakes</u> (SS) weekends are nearly upon us. The popular operating events — one for CW and the other for phone — typically attract approximately 3,000 logs combined. For this 77th-running ARRL November Sweepstakes, the CW event is November 3 – 5 (UTC), and the phone event is November 17 – 19 (UTC). Each starts at 2100 UTC on that Saturday and runs through 0259 UTC on that Monday. Stations may operate 24 of the available 30 hours. **Logs are due within seven days after the event is over.** Last year saw 1,275 entries for the CW weekend,

while the phone weekend attracted 1,674 logs.

The challenge of SS — or "Sweeps" — is to work as many stations in as many of the 83 <u>ARRL and Radio Amateurs of Canada (RAC)</u> sections as possible within the 24 available hours. The number of sections worked is a score multiplier. Making a "clean sweep" is the goal of many SS aficionados — working all 83 of the available US and Canadian multipliers, and qualifying for a clean sweep coffee mug. In the 2017 CW event, only 10 operators managed to "work them all." SSB participants had better luck with 78 clean sweeps. Last year, Puerto Rico (PR) and the US Virgin Islands (VI) were still reeling from devastating hurricanes.

At one time, the most difficult SS multiplier was Northern Territories (NT) in Canada, where J. Allen, VY1JA, in Yukon Territory, often was the only station available. That's changed, now that the VY1JA station not only has been thoroughly upgraded but is able to be remotely operated (as VY1AAA), although by a Canadian operator, thanks to Gerry Hull, W1VE/VE1RM, who plans to be at the helm of VY1AAA again this year for both the CW and phone weekends, operating SOHP.

The antenna complement in Yukon Territory is a 4-element quad at 45 feet for 20 – 10, a 2-element phased ground plane array on 40, and a single element ground plane on 80. "J has constantly been working on antennas as time and weather permits, and we should have some more antennas ready for 160 and later contest events," he told ARRL.

Hull said he prefers to operate CW at or above 32 WPM but will honor any request for him to QRS. He expects to hang out in the bottom 5 kHz of the band or above 40 kHz from the bottom.

"Take a moment to send thanks to J, VY1JA, for the tremendous work he has done to keep it all running," he urged.

Other hard ones in 2017 appear to have been Alberta (AB), Northern New York (NNY), US Virgin Islands (VI), and Wyoming (WY).

SS is a "domestic" contest with broad appeal, and even stations with modest equipment and antennas can enjoy success. Many stations like to operate in the QRP category (output of five W or less), although that challenge is more daunting in this stage of the solar cycle.

<u>ARRL November Sweepstakes</u> is the oldest domestic radiosport event (the first was in 1930). The SS contest exchange has deep roots in message-handling protocol and replicates a radiogram preamble. In SS, stations exchange:

- A **consecutive serial number** (NR). Operators do not have to add leading zeros on serial numbers below 100.
- Operating category Q for Single Op QRP; A for Single Op, Low Power (up to 150 W output); B for Single Op, High Power (greater than 150 W output); U for Single Op, Unlimited, regardless of power; M for Multioperator, regardless of power, and S for School Club.
- Your call sign.
- Check (CK) the last two digits of the year of first license for either operator or station.
- Section ARRL/RAC Section.

"Casual operators are very important to SS, so I would advise that if you come across [operators] who just want to help you out with a QSO, take the time to walk them through the proper exchange sequence and encourage them to work other stations and to submit a log," said now-retired SS Manager Larry Hammel, K5OT. "Your patience might be rewarded with a motivated op next year!"

The SS Operating Guide package, available for <u>download</u>, explains how to participate in the Sweepstakes, including all rules and examples of log formatting. Clubs or public service teams thinking about entering this year will find the guide a useful source for information.

The deadline to submit CW entries is November 12. The deadline to submit phone entries is November 26.

Club Eligibility Lists

A system is in place to submit <u>club eligibility</u> lists, either by <u>uploading</u> a file of eligible members or by copying and pasting from a list, right up until the time of the contest — November 3 at 2100 UTC in the case of SS CW, and November 17 at 2100 UTC in the case of SS phone.
