

First of all, you have to dream up the concept, and then you need the help of lots of talented people.

Our own Greg Brown, KTØK, is the famous Chief Preparator of Vertebrate Paleontology at the University of Nebraska State Museum and he lives in Malcolm, NE.

Next you try to get one of the most interesting and talented local sculptors who also lives in Malcolm, NE to agree to give our group a presentation October 11, on how he came to leave his chosen field of Taxidermy and conceive his current successes in Museums, Bronze statues, Dinosaurs, and other projects - Fred Hoppe.

Oh yes, he designed, built the mock-up, and finally created and transported the giant 26 foot long and 17 foot high Mammoth Bronze Statue called "Archie" at the front steps of Morrill Hall. How he did that is a story in itself that you won't want to miss!

He has also created many other statue sculptures right here on the University campus and around the nation. One is the Football players' statue "Husker Legacy" on the east side of Memorial Stadium. In 2002, one of his works, "Mule Deer" was installed at Cabella's sporting goods store in Kansas City, Kansas for their grand opening.

SKYWARN #6 - SEPTEMBER 15

It was 2 months to the day since we were last called out and the conditions were similar. A line of storms to our west produced several "Severe Thunderstorm," and later, "Tornado Warnings." In fact, a tornado damaged a mobile home in the David City area.

In Lancaster County, spotters were requested when a single cell moved into Saline County; luckily, the request came at the end of the Friday night net and many of our spotters were checked in. Officially, the net started at 10 PM, but the cell of interest had quickly moved into Lancaster County, the National Weather Service labeled it a "SuperCell" and a member of the Emergency Management team in Cheney reported a lowering.

With none of our spotters on location, sirens were sounded for the southern half of Lancaster County (based on the "SuperCell"), and then for the Lincoln area (based on the report from Cheney). Heavy rain, and some localized flooding was reported from the cell but no other damage was noted.

SKYWARN #7 - SEPTEMBER 16

Wow! See SkyWarn #6, move the line to the east by about 50 miles and away we go. Lancaster County Emergency Management called us out at 10:24 PM for another 90 minute net. Spotter reported a spectacular "light" show, some heavy localized rain but not much else.

STATE FAIR RESULTS

By the time the Fair closed, 93 stations had helped with our coverage logging 1,692 total hours, 658.7 bike miles, 5,010.4 auto miles getting to and returning from the Fair.

More importantly, we helped with 224 situations including finding 11 lost kids and 10 lost parents. In the parking lots, we found 102 lost cars, summoned help for 5 dead batteries, 2 lock-outs and 10 miscellaneous car problems. Our team reported 3 medical situations to 9-1-1, reported 2 fights to State Patrol and found 5 purses or wallets.

Once these items are finalized, Art can start to work on interfacing with the IC-706 which will give us both HF and 2-meter remote access. Add a few toys and we can remote access an antenna switch for 6-meters (we still need an antenna installed) and perhaps even include CW a mode that current remotes access software will not support. One thing is for certain, Art is very creative and the club is in his good hands so remote access is definitely a doable thing. When will we be "remote on-the-air"? Our goal is December. What to do until then? Get a hold of any board member and you can operate the old fashion way - from in front of the rig.

-The Auction Treasurer's Record of Sales will be considered as true and final.
