MEET YOUR FELLOW HAM: ERIC BIGHAM, KØJIA

I first became interested in Amateur Radio when I was in high school in the 1990s. One of my brother's friends got his license while he was only in middle school and soon became a Lancaster County storm spotter. Teenagers could spot by themselves back then. I was shocked, not realizing that kids my age (at that time) could become spotters!

I read in the newspaper about a local kid who built a transceiver out of a sardine can. He used it when straight-line winds knocked out power regionally during the Great Plains Derecho of 1993.

I started investigating how I could acquire my own license. The local RadioShack had all the answers and the regulation book. There was the CW requirement. As bad as I am with foreign languages, I knew getting my license would be tough, so I put the idea on the back burner. Even so, I had dreams of becoming a storm chaser or a meteorologist.

Fast forward to 2004 and the Hallam tornado. Not too long before the storm hit, I bought a 2 meter receiver from RadioShack. I still had yet to get my license. That evening, I listened as Reynolds Davis, KØGND, ran a magnificent net. He was calm, collected, and professional at the mic. I was very impressed. That experience reignited my determination to get my license.

Interestingly enough, two mornings later, I boarded a plane bound for China to get married. My Amateur Radio license plan ended up waiting a few more years.

My wife and I were introduced to each other through mutual acquaintances. SARS was going through China at the time. No one was working or shopping. She was bored and wanted to learn English from a native speaker. We fell in love over phone calls on the weekends, chats via AIM or Yahoo! Messenger, and snail mail.

After we were married, the FCC dropped the CW requirement, and I was all in. With her blessing, I studied and soon passed the technician exam. I was KCØZX, and a few weeks later, I passed the general. At that time, vanity call signs were only for generals or above. I soon became KØJIA. The suffix is my wife's name.

I've been a ham radio operator for about 11 years. I have participated in quite a few public service events over the years, including the Special Olympics, State Games of America, Cornhusker State Games, and the Lancaster County Fair.



MEET YOUR FELLOW HAM: JIM BRAZEE, KCØCWW

When I was working in the Sumner, Nebraska, School District in 1958, I read an article in *Science Digest* about shortwave listening that was very interesting. I bought a five-tube Hallicrafters S-53 Shortwave Receiver and had a great time listening to stations all over the world, using a copper wire antenna strung between trees.

I began listening to Hams who were using AM, but I had trouble tuning some of them as they sounded like gibberish. I bought a newer receiver, a Hallicrafters SX-100, thinking this might help, but it did not. Eventually, I found the strange-sounding Hams were the ones using SSB, which was just coming into vogue.

Eventually, I decided to try to get a license, studying from books. I passed the novice test with a Ham while we were both at summer school at Kansas State University. I got on the air with the call KNØCWW in 1960, and I worked many other stations only using CW. One of the problems early on was frequency drift.

After a few months on the novice band, trying to improve my code speed, I drove to the Richard Bolling Federal Building In Kansas City, Kansas, to take the test for the general. I was very rattled and could not copy the code. I gave up and did not copy for a minute or two, and then I tried to copy the last couple minutes. I gave my copy page to the official, saying "I did not pass." He looked at the page and said he found 65 consecutive characters. I had passed, which was very exciting.

I went to Butler, Missouri, and traded in some of my gear for later models to help further my ham radio hobby. I operated from Sumner, Genoa, Pender, and Lincoln over time. Building Heathkit radio equipment over the years was one of my joys.

In about 1970, I went to Omaha and passed the test for the advanced license, which I still hold. My best station worked that I remember was located at McMurdo Station, Antarctica, which is about 500 miles from the South Pole.

Branched Oak Observatory is 25 minutes from downtown Lincoln near Branched Oak State Park. Located at the QTH of Matt Anderson, KAØBOJ, the viewing facility is ideally located for viewing the night sky. Observers enjoy looking at a variety of nighttime objects such as Jupiter, Saturn, and Mars. Check out the moon without interference from city lights and take a picture through the telescope with your own cell phone!

We will have 4-6 astronomers on site to guide you through the sights in the night sky. Bring lawn chairs, blankets, air chairs, etc., if you wish to sit or lie on the ground and enjoy the heavens. Please bring snacks and non-alcoholic drinks.

We have a roll-style observatory along with a variety of portable scopes, including a 14" Dobsonian. Bring a light jacket and some mosquito spray. We will have a porta potty available along with our visitors' center. We look forward to seeing you at the observatory.


Directions from Lincoln:

- ◆ Take I-180 north, which becomes US-34 West. Travel west for 7.5 miles.
- ◆ Turn right onto NE-79/NW 56th Street. Travel north for 5 miles.
- ◆ Turn left on W Raymond Road. Travel west for 3 miles.
- ◆ Turn left on NW 98th Street. Travel south for 0.5 miles.

CAPTAIN COOK COMMEMORATIVE SPECIAL EVENT



The Pontefract and District Amateur Radio Society (PDARS) in the UK has been assigned special event call sign GB250CC (GB250ØCC) to mark the 250th anniversary of the first voyage of explorer Captain James Cook. PDARS plans to apply for a series of regulatory variances (NOV) to coincide with key moments in the voyage and hopes to make contacts with the Pacific Islands that Cook visited 250 years ago. The first NOV for August 23 will mark

Cook's departure from Plymouth on his first voyage. Nigel Ferguson, GØBPK, a member of the Captain Cook Society (www.captaincookociety.com) and of PDARS, said Cook rose from a humble background through the ranks.

"The Royal Society had approached the Admiralty for a ship to sail to Tahiti and view the Transit of Venus in 1769, a rare astronomical observation," Ferguson explained. "The Admiralty insisted that the captain should be from the Navy, and James Cook was chosen. This was the first scientific voyage of discovery." The bark *Endeavour* set sail on August 25, 1768. Ferguson expressed the hope that regulator Ofcom will continue to allow NOV's for GB250CC for the next three years. Logs will be uploaded to Logbook of the World (LoTW).
