LARC ARES 2-METER NET OPERATORS

LARC is active in the Amateur Radio Emergency Service, (ARES[®]), a program of the ARRL, which is comprised of organized, trained, qualified, and credentialed Amateur Radio operators who provide radio communications during emergencies and disasters. These individuals augment and support vital communications on behalf of the public through partner agencies and organizations during emergencies and disasters. ARES[®] radio communicators strive to be effective partners in emergency response, providing public service partners at all levels with radio communication expertise, capability, and capacity.

Every evening, at 9:00 pm, an ARES[®] net is held on 146.76. It provides an opportunity to practice net protocol, ensure equipment is working, become more at ease with talking on the radio, and get to know the other radio operators in the area.

Each net is run by a volunteer, who gives of their time and skill to ensure that the net runs smoothly. Here are your net controllers:

SUNDAY

Bryan Leavitt, WØBCL

Bryan, WØBCL, is a veteran net control operator. Bryan has been hosting the Sunday net for many years. As part of the Sunday net, he provides updates on the weekly weather and sunspot activity. Bryan has served on the LARC Board and helps teach the ham radio classes offered each fall and spring. He is a longtime volunteer for the American Red Cross.

Monday

Eric Vander Woude Jr., KØEVW

Eric, KØEVW, is a mechanical engineering student at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. He took over the Monday nightly net as a high school student shortly

instruments (I'm also a musician). Around that same time, I learned that fractals had found a new use in antenna design. A fractal is a repeating pattern that continuously gets smaller. This turned out to be a major breakthrough in antenna design. Not only could the antennas be made much smaller, they were also very broad band antennas. This is what gives our smartphones the various RF capabilities: Cellular, Wi-Fi, and Bluetooth.

It was several years later I was doing some research and discovered Amateur Radio. I knew this would be a good platform to experiment and learn more. I bought my first radio, and the KØKKV net was the first Amateur Radio group I listened to. I enjoyed listening to the different net control stations and really appreciated it being available every night. When Eric Bigham, KØJIA, asked me to help keep the net going, I was happy to do so, and I've been doing it ever since.

At a time when many nets are going dark, 146.760 ARES net operates seven days a week. Take a minute at 9:00 pm on 146.760 and say hello to the ARES net operators. Ask for a radio check or just sign in with call sign. Comments are always welcome.

ARES HAPPENINGS

NEBRASKA ARES SETE 2019 Simulated Emergency Training Exercise (SETE)

Sunday, October 26, 2019, 9:00 am - 12:00 pm

Nebraska Section Amateur Radio Emergency Services (ARES) will be conducting an SETE on Saturday, October 26, 2019. The purposes of the exercise are to evaluate strengths and weaknesses in emergency preparedness and communications and demonstrate Amateur Radio to the organizations and public we serve. Amateur Radio operators in the Nebraska Section are encouraged to participate from their home stations, deploy to a field location suitable for Amateur Radio activities, or activate local emergency operations centers. Please consult your county's Emergency Coordinator for details. Those amateurs in Lancaster County who wish to participate should sign up by visiting <u>KOKKV.org</u>.

The goal of the 2019 Nebraska Section SETE is to test the ability of stations operating in FM Simplex or through repeaters, while on battery backup, to pass messages to localized, specific destinations throughout the state. In addition to localized, specific message handling, local leaders such as your EC, DEC, and ASEC will utilize other forms of communication to pass traffic to the SEC that can include DSTAR, DMR, HF, and packet.

Simple messages will be generated to send to the destination stations. This will help test the stations' abilities to accurately copy and pass messages. NTS formatted messaging will be utilized at the AEC to SEC level.
